2021, a year we were finally able to open the doors again. With shed parties, members days, practical and taster sessions throughout the 12 months I don't think we have had so many people visit Kenwood. It was good to see everyone again.

We re-launched the beginners course with a fantastic group of up and coming beekeepers. They adapted well to the theory sessions on Zoom. Taking advantage of the technology they even got to know each other using 'Break-out' areas and were super accommodating at some of the early practical sessions with restrictions and the weather. Other online sessions including the popular Hive Hour with John Hauxwell as guest speaker, a great fountain of knowledge in answering all those bee related questions. Many thanks to John. There were some great talks from Tara Chapman who shared her insights to the beekeeping year Texan style and Julie Pigott returned to help us identify bumble bees. Another highlight was honey extraction, a first in nearly two years. With a fairly good harvest from over a dozen supers, the honey was jarred with newly commissioned labels to celebrate each apiary.

This year we say goodbye to Martin Stiksel, our Membership Secretary who has now decided to stay in Australia. He has not only taken very good care of the bees at Kenwood but organised everybody's membership renewals and BBKA returns over the years. Always on hand for support and to answer queries even when he relocated to the other side of the world. Best of luck down under Martin!

It is a great opportunity to give something back, have fun, meet other beekeepers and be part a community. Apiary Report

Kenwood

We began the year with just 2 overwintered colonies. We bought 2 nucleus colonies from Paynes Beefarm and were kindly donated 2 more colonies. We ended the season with 6 strong colonies in full size hives and 1 in a nucleus box. The new cleaning station was installed in the Spring and is such an asset to the apiary. We have changed all the hives from standard nationals to 14x12's. We used extension boxes, so that the existing brood boxes can still be used.

We ran 4 sessions for the beginners course, 2 days of taster sessions, a day for the Basic Exam,4 members open days and 2 shed parties. This is a great achievement, considering all the constantly changing restrictions due to COVID over the season. We were able to take 8 supers of honey from the hives at the end of the season. Some of this honey has been sold to the Cafe in Highgate Woods and some will be held back to sell at events in 2022. Once the COVID restrictions were relaxed, we were helped by a small dedicated team each week - many thanks to them for all their hard work.

Alexandra Palace

After a season of several artificial swarms during April, there are six strong colonies settled in at Alexandra Palace. Several big maintenance jobs were undertaken at the apiary this year including replacing the fence with a new long lasting material, new windows and repainting the shed. Thank you to everyone who helped with these and the general beekeeping, very much appreciated. There were five supers of honey extracted this year with big thanks to Capital Gardens for the use of their facilities. Most of which has now been sold with the new label design proving very popular.

Highgate Wood

There are two colonies and a nuc at Highgate Wood. The supercedure from previous year resulted in another supercedure in early Spring, followed by another supercedure. The white queens have not had much luck this year in part due to the weather creating short windows of opportunity resulted in queens failing. We did extract one super of honey which was welcomed by the rangers and other local shops. All colonies have been treated and supplied with fondant late last year.



Membership Report

By the end of 2021 NLB had 154 members. Those were:

133 Full members 13 Partner members 6 Associate members 2 Junior members

154 is slightly up from 148, which was the number of members for the year ending in December 2020. 2021 was the year the NLB Beginners Course was back and with 25 participants this remains our strongest source of new members. Taster Sessions


